



Kimberly Winkle – Milk Paint

Kimberly Winkle is a maker who creates furniture and objects using wood and paint; her work displays a balance of form, color and surface pattern. She has exhibited nationally and internationally, including SOFA Chicago, Wanted Design NYC and the Architectural Digest Home Show. Her work has been included in a number of publications, including Fine Woodworking, Woodworker, and Woodworker West magazines and the books 500 Tables, 500 Chairs, Fine Woodworking Design Book 8, among others. Winkle has completed several artist residencies, including the International Turning Exchange (I.T.E.) at the Center for Art in Wood in Philadelphia, the Windgate Artist Residency at State University New York (SUNY) Purchase, Haystack Mountain School of Crafts, Vermont Studio Center and at the Appalachian Center for Craft. She has been awarded 4 Niche awards, a State of Tennessee Individual Artist Award in 2011 and the Society of Arts and Crafts (Boston) John D. Mineck furniture fellowship in 2014.

**From Drab to Pizzazz: Milk Paint and Surface Embellishment:
Kimberly Winkle**

You keep hearing of Milk Paint over and over again but have no idea really what it is or how to begin using it, right? Kimberly will demystify Milk Paint. During the demonstration, students will learn how to properly mix, use, and explore the infinite possibilities of Milk Paint. Although Milk Paint is often associated with traditional furniture forms, the material can be used on practically any surface or format: metal, stretched canvas, bedroom walls, kitchen cabinets, toys, furniture... Your only limitation is your imagination. Milk Paint is incredibly durable, eco-friendly and comes in a delicious color palette. Students will learn how to use Milk Paint and to explore the wide range of visual possibilities. The techniques learned can be translated to any number of other projects or formats.

The Lisle Park District has permitted the resumption of events at the Museum in time for this year's Depot Days. Sponsored by the Park District, the Village of Lisle, and the Lisle Heritage Association, this event celebrates the history of the several buildings in the museum as well as equipment, trades, and activities of bygone times.

Windy City Woodturners participate by demonstrating woodturning on lathes from a reproduction 13th century design Spring Pole, to an actual 1700's Treadle, to a 1910 motorized Sheldon. The latest acquisition is a 1950's Delta which with some luck will be operational as well.

Heritage Society Christmas Ornament

Once again this year Windy City Woodturners will participate with the Lisle Heritage Society to produce 150 Christmas ornaments. They will be for sale at major museum events for the benefit of the Society. Windy City has usually packaged up materials and instructions using meetings to dispense and collect finished components. This year turners we will instead get together in the Woodcraft Woodridge shop to create components.

SINCE THE ORNAMENT IS TRADITIONALLY HELD SECRET UNTIL IT IS FIRST OFFERED FOR SALE AT DEPOT DAYS, I WILL NOT SHOW OR TELL WHAT IT IS IN THIS RELATIVELY PUBLIC DOCUMENT.

Generically, here is a description of the shape we will be turning. We'll start with a half inch length of 1 ¼" dowel and roughly center it on a waste block with double backed tape. We'll turn the dowel section to a 1 1/8" diameter. Then we'll scrape a smooth dome on the top 1/8" using a spindle gouge. Next we'll put a taper on the 3/8" remaining to a 1" diameter at the waste block. Sand the dome and apply a couple of details with skew and scraper. If you have not imagined what the ornament is, that's good. You will learn more if you work on the project.



Heritage Society Christmas Ornament

We'll be using 4 Ryobi mini's with $\frac{3}{4}$ x 8" spindle. Bring your chuck or face plate and waste block. Recommended tools are: Sharp 1//2 or 3/8" spindle gouges, a vernier caliper, Skew, Small end- grain scraper (your skew might work). Keep in mind this is a small scale project so your largest tools are not necessary. Double back tape, sand paper and dowel blanks will be provided.

The shop will be at our disposal from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm on Saturday August 7. Our target is 80 acceptable components which should be quite achievable. As usual, this is a manufacturing project intended to hand the workers further down the assembly line parts of "identical" shape and size. THIS EVENT WILL BE LIMITED TO MEMBERS WHO ARE FULLY VACCINATED, THANK YOU.

This is a worthy service project for the village and park district. But beyond that it is an opportunity to develop skills in making identical shapes. That is, actually turning things repeatedly to size and shape intended. Many who have participated in past ornaments have gained from the experience in that respect also.
