Our May demo will have Andy Kuby demonstrating some of his techniques for inside out turning.



I've been to a ton of demonstrations over the years, countless demos done by local members at the local club; local turners demonstrating at events like SOFA and Woodcraft and county fairs, weekend-long regional symposia, and the last 6 AAW national symposia. Conservatively I'd say I've probably seen 150 demonstrations.



One demonstrations stands out in my mind, but maybe not for the reason that you might think. I often reference this demonstration during my own demonstrations so some of you might have already heard this story.

I was the local liaison for the 2014 AAW Symposium in Phoenix, the primary point of contact for everything at the local level. Going into the symposium I knew I would be incredibly busy and would likely only be able to see a couple of the 11 rotations that would be offered. The 2 demos I had on my list were John Beaver's wave bowls demo and Derek Weidman's drawing on the lathe demo. Ultimately due to circumstances largely out of my control I only had the opportunity to see John Beaver's demo.

I had seen John's wave bowls on the internet for several years prior, I had also spoken to someone briefly that had seen John's demo previously and who had taken a class with John. I already had a pretty good idea of John's process but there were definitely some elements of the process that I hadn't figured out yet.

This Month's Demonstration

Inside Out Turning by Andy Kuby

Inside-out turning is a process where you take four pieces of square wood, or three pieces of a triangular wood, glue them together and turn a design (usually a silhouette)into the part that will be the inside of the piece. Then take this apart, rotate the pieces, glue them back together and turn the outside. This is why it's called inside-out turning.

I am an architect and real estate consultant who has always been involved in carpentry, woodworking, and construction. In 1988 a real estate partner gave me a Delta lathe. I wasn't quite sure what to do with it at first but over the next few years I managed to "turn" a couple of passable pieces, break the cast iron banjo and some tools before relegating it, and the screaming bearings, to the

darkest portion of the garage. In 2000 I took a class with Binh Pho who introduced me to real turning, good equipment, and the Chicago Woodturners. Fifteen years later I am still a member of the Chicago Woodturners, an occasional demonstrator, part time instructor and mentor.

I am still working on my 10,000 hours but making progress.

Approximately 15 minutes into the 90 minute demo I had the figurative "lightbulb over my head" moment. The pieces fell into place and not only could I understand what John was doing at that moment but I knew what the next several steps would be. I was no longer in the audience watching the magician on the stage pull a rabbit out of a hat, I was standing at the side of the stage seeing where the rabbit was really coming from and how the magician managed to pull it off.

I spent the rest of the demo watching the rest of the audience. Periodically you could see a lightbulb go off over someone else's head, as they began to realize the process and would even start to get ahead of John in the demo having figured the rest of it out. Nearing the end of the demo John reached a turning point where the obvious reveal finally happens. In that moment the remaining 80 percent of the audience saw John's trick and suddenly the room was awash with glowing lightbulbs and there was a collective "Oh!" as the final piece of the puzzle clicked into place. I'll never forget that moment, that single moment when the majority of the audience collectively understood the process.

I now get to experience that moment on a regular basis, but I get to do it from John's perspective. As I'm demonstrating my Saturn bowl process I get to see the lightbulbs illuminate over people's heads as they figure out my process; slowly at first, one or two at a time until, finally, the real secret is revealed. In fact my demonstration is intentionally structured in a way that the moment of the big reveal is somewhat hidden. In that way I get to experience that "Oh!" moment when I finally reveal how I pulled a rabbit out of my hat and the audience finally understands.

WCWT 2019 Committee Descriptions

Raffle-Rich Nye

Source wood, tools, and woodturning related accessories from various sources including donations, discounts, and purchases to be used for the monthly raffle. Raffle tickets are sold at the beginning of each meeting and items are raffled off at the middle of the meeting.
