The Collaborative Process

"Working together to solve a number of problems on the piece resulted in better solutions than each would have come up with individually".

A typical collaborative con-

sists of one artist working on a piece and then a second artist, working independently, adds their work. Many individuals may be involved. The final piece rarely shows a shared vision, but shows each artist's ideas. Don and Rich took a different approach, jointly planning and truly working together.

> Rich and Don had recently taken a class with nick Agar, and wanted to use some of the techniques learned there. In addition, they jointly tried out some hand and power carving, captive rings and painting, working together in planning and learning from one another. Using a sample (sacrificial) piece, they jointly found solutions to various problems, including paint bleeding from one section to another. Sanding sealer and tape on the unpainted section solved that particular problem.

> The final piece, in beautifully flamed box elder, is a "Royal Scepter", based on an antique
