Library Review by Rich Hall-Reppen

The Windy City Woodturners library has both books and DVD's. During the May meeting Al Miotke, a WCW member who also happens to be the President of the AAW Segmented Woodturners Group, is discussing the various ways to take a board and make a bowl out of it. Our club library contains two DVD's by well known segmenter, Malcolm Tibbets. "Lessons in Segmenting - Volume 1 - Getting Started". Volume 1 is for "anyone who with minimal woodturning and woodworking skills will be able to make stunning turnings with these techniques. There are even many "methods of work" for the more experienced segmenter to help improve and speed the assembly of segmented pieces. Volume 3 of the series (there are 8 DVD's available on Malcolm's website tahoeturner.com) is titled "Exploring Possibilities". Volume 3 is for the experienced segmenter and woodworker. Malcolm discusses and demonstrates a variety of techniques including Compound-Mitered Staves, Tubular Construction, Ribbons and many more. HIs goal is to provide examples of variations of standard techniques to allow the woodturner to take their own work in new directions.

I'll have these two DVD's out on the Library cart at the back of the room for your review and to check out. The Windy City Woodturners has over 35 books and 85 DVD's on a variety of woodturning and woodworking topics that are available to borrow. Rich Hall-Reppen

Getting to Know Us – Rich Nye

I grew up in northern California and spent all my summers in the redwoods as a child. I think that this was the original spark that started my love of wood and nature. I went to college at the Univ. of Calif. at Berkeley and graduated with a BS degree in civil engineering. I was then drafted in 1966 by the Cubs and was pitching in Wrigley Field 2 months later. Spent 4+ years in the major leagues with the Cubs, Cards, and Expos. Won 13 games as a rookie and made the rookie all-star team in 1967.

After baseball I went back to school to get a veterinary degree as I recognized that I could do engineering work, but wasn't passionate about it. I have now practiced for over 40 years. The last 30 years have been with exotic pets only, that is all pets but dogs and cats. My wife and I opened the first all-exotic practice in the US in 1985. I still practice part-time and live in the western suburbs with my wife and a lot of animals.

I attended meetings of the West Suburban Woodturners for about a year and a half in their old meeting location of Downers Grove. I didn't have space for a workshop and had no equipment.

The crowning moment for me was taking a week long class at John C. Campbell. After I got back home, I bought a lathe and some tools and have been turning now for about 10 years. I attend as many classes as I can, buy all types and sizes of wood for projects, and am passionate about what I do. I've surely found the thing that will bring me much happiness for the rest of my life.

I do have a website on Etsy.com where I put forward items for sale. It's under the store name of nyewoodturning. I also post pieces on nyewoodturning.tumblr.com. to illustrate the variety of pieces that I produce and can make on a commission basis. Rich
