In the Fall of 2006 I was attending one of my first woodturning meetings at the Arizona Woodturners Association in Phoenix AZ, a club that I would later spend nearly 7 years as an officer for. As I was browsing the instant gallery. I moved from piece to piece examining the craftsmanship and admiring the wood. struck up a conversation with a fellow woodturner who was standing next to me. I had never met him before that day; as we introduced ourselves we quickly determined that we had a lot in common.

As it turns out Collin and I had both grown up in Idaho, about 30 miles apart and about 800 miles from the meeting location that day. I had visited his high school and he had visited mine. Though we were a few years apart we knew some of the same people and he was aware of some of the members of my family, particularly my paternal Grandfather who owned and operated a local jewelry store. As the conversation continued the topic turned to outdoor activities we had participated in. Hiking, biking, fishing, skiing, and eventually rock climbing.

Rock climbing was a staple activity of my youth. The basalt cliffs south of town were a draw from all around the region. I even took my future wife on a date to climb those cliffs, although that's a different story. Collin and I talked about those cliffs and our families. I mentioned a rock climbing competition called the Pocatello Pump and that while I had never competed in it one of my brothers had. I mentioned that I didn't know when the competition was held, that I didn't even know if it was still being held and that I also didn't know if my brother even competed anymore. Shortly after, the meeting resumed and I mostly forgot about the conversation – until I returned home a couple hours later.





This Month's Demonstration







Keith Lackner, world renowned and leading artist in Resin Infusions, has been a hobbyist woodworker since 1994 and started wood turning in 2012. In 2013 he had a vision to make something that would shock the turning community and send his craft as a wood turner in a different direction. That vision was to create a large vessel using exotic and highly figured burls and infuse them with casting resins. He unlocked a process to create one-of-a-kind pieces of art that he calls Resin Infusions. This process propelled his craft. He has been featured in multiple publications all over the world and you can find his pieces for sale in art galleries across the United States.

He now shares his knowledge and techniques in magazine articles, turning clubs and hands on classes to teach others this art form.

In addition to creating large one-of-a-kind pieces he also enjoys making functional and attractive, everyday pieces like bowls, platters and peppermills using highly figured woods that sets his work apart from the rest.







As I walked in the door I received a phone call from my mother whose voice was somewhat breathless and clearly distraught. My brother had been climbing in the Pocatello Pump a couple hours earlier and there had been ar

moment was helplessly falling 40 feet to the ground below?

climbing in the Pocatello Pump a couple hours earlier and there had been an accident. I didn't get all the details of the circumstances until much later but the important facts were that he had fallen from a significant height; approximately 40 feet. He was in the hospital with a broken back, a serious injury to be sure. Luckily, he had landed on the only object in the area that could break his fall – his wife, who had been on the other end of the rope as his safety belay to catch him in the event of a fall. Of course, that also meant that she was also in the hospital, with a broken femur and was undergoing surgery to implant a titanium rod.

Nearly 13 years later I still wonder about the odds. What are the odds that I met and had a conversation with this fellow woodturner at that meeting? That we had grown up 30 miles apart? That I had mentioned the Pocatello Pump by name, on the very day, possibly the very hour that my brother was competing, and possibly even having that conversation at the exact

Whatever the odds are I'm sure they're astronomical and I can't help but feel it wasn't a coincidence. As funny as it sounds I truly believe my brother was surprisingly lucky that day, had he not landed on his wife he likely would have sustained more serious injuries. 2-3 feet to either side and he likely would have landed on jagged rocks. He's continued to be lucky. Since that time he's survived multiple avalanches while skiing and even survived a chainsaw accident where he was cut on the inner thigh, just missing his femoral artery (yet another story).







I'll always have fond memories of that club in Arizona and my time there but looking back this might be the most vivid memory that I have of that club. An innocuous conversation at a woodturning meeting with a guy I'd never met before that somehow paralleled one of the most serious medical issues that's ever happened to my family.




WCWT 2019 Committee Descriptions

WCWT 2019 Committee Descriptions (cont)

Raffle- Rich Nye

Source wood, tools, and woodturning related accessories from various sources including donations, discounts, and purchases to be used for the monthly raffle. Raffle tickets are sold at the beginning of each meeting and items are raffled off at the middle of the meeting. Proceeds from the raffle go back to the club to offset club expenses and to fund the raffle itself. Certain item(s) may require multiple months of selling tickets in order to cover the costs of the item(s) and provide adequate profit to the club. Receipts for items that have been purchased are expected to be provide to the treasurer whenever possible so that the purchases can be balanced against the raffle line item in the budget.
