Back in early August the club had an opportunity to do some ornament demonstrations at Rockler in Bolingbrook. The demonstrators were myself, Don Johnston, Dave Neybert, and Rich Rohrback. Several other club members were in attendance in the audience as well as six to ten non-club

members. I used the opportunity to make some of the ornaments that we're making for the Lisle Historical Society, and to practice for an ornament turning demonstration I recently submitted a demonstration proposal for.

As things were starting to wind down one gentleman in the audience approached me and made a comment along the lines of "I thought I was doing pretty good until I saw you guys turn today". I understand that sentiment as I was once that guy in the audience watching someone with skills and techniques that I didn't yet possess. I vividly remember the first time I saw someone turn with a bowl gouge live in person. He was doing things with that tool that I knew were impossible – because I had already tried and failed miserably.

I also recently received an email from a woman who attended one of my rotations at the Tennessee Symposium back in January. I was a last-minute fill-in when one of the scheduled demonstrators had to cancel due to health issues. When I was approached about being a substitute demonstrator I agreed pretty much immediately and quickly booked my flight before asking for permission from my wife and my manager at work. It was a whirlwind week of prep work leading up to the symposium and 8 demonstrations over 2 days is an exhausting amount of work but this one message from this one woman made it all worth it:

Important Club Vote

At the beginning of each year the board presents to the membership a budget that includes, among other things, projected club expenditures for the year. If we are aware of a specific item, or category of item, that is spelled out in the budget. The membership then votes to approve this budget. This gives the board approval for that expenditure.

On occasion the club has been faced with the need to make a decision on the purchase of needed items that were not budgeted. Currently the Club By-Laws require that the membership as a whole vote on any non-budgeted expenditure. This means that in an emergency or a situation of urgency the expenditure could not occur until the membership had voted on it. An example may be something as simple as extra cables for the AV system or as significant as lathe repair.

The board is proposing the following amendment to the By-Laws so that it will be able to purchase necessary items without the delay associated with waiting until the next meeting for approval.

"Upon approval of the majority of the board of directors the board is authorized to approve and execute a capital expenditure of up to \$499.99 without requiring the approval of the general membership of Windy City Woodturners"

At the October meeting you will be asked to vote on the inclusion of this amendment in the By-Laws

Annual WCWT Garage Sale

Our Garage Sale was a huge success this year. We had twelve people participate who were able to sell something. They were offering for sale many items that were surplus to them but that others will find useful. It was a great time to pick up a different turning tool, machine, accessory, or even wood to be made into something useful.

The total sale amount was nearly \$2,300. The club's portion of this was \$229. This will help us continue to fund the projects that will improve your club.

During the garage sale one table featured more than 100 turning tools. Recently a friend to many of us passed away - Rich Rossio. Rich loved woodturning and mentored many of us as well as being a reseller of pen components and wood turning tools. The sale of the tools benefited his estate. On the other side of the room some of the wood from his estate was also for sale. The sale went very well and we were able to collect and return the money to his wife - Laura. Her entire family thanks you for being kind and it reflects how great the woodturning community supports one another. Sometime in early November there will be a garage sale at Rich's house. 

WCWT 2019 Committee Descriptions (cont)

Raffle- Rich Nye

Source wood, tools, and woodturning related accessories from various sources including donations, discounts, and purchases to be used for the monthly raffle. Raffle tickets are sold at the beginning of each meeting and items are raffled off at the middle of the meeting. Proceeds from the raffle go back to the club to offset club expenses and to fund the raffle itself. Certain item(s) may require multiple months of selling tickets in order to cover the costs of the item(s) and provide adequate profit to the club. Receipts for items that have been purchased are expected to be provide to the treasurer whenever possible so that the purchases can be balanced against the raffle line item in the budget.

Research and make recommendations on audio/video decisions and purchases based on the club needs, bearing in mind possible future uses including remote video purchases and the ability to record demonstrations.

Setup and run audio and video equipment at club meetings and presentations. Projector, screen, cameras, audio, and software. Recommendations should account for capabilities now and in the future, budget, and storage limitations.

Library- Rich Hall-Reppen

Organize and maintain the club's stock of books, magazines, DVDs, and other materials. Maintain records of items that have been borrowed by club members. Source additional/replacement materials for the library within the budget assigned. Provide relavent article about available library material for monthly newsletter.

WCWT 2019 Committee Descriptions (cont)

<u>Christmas Party- Peter D'Attomo</u>

Make arrangements for the club's holiday party including location, reservations, menu, invitation/head count, etc. Work with Treasurer to determine appropriate budget, and portion of the expense to be paid for by club members.



Garage Sale – Peter D'Attomo

Organize and facilitate the club's annual garage sale event, including soliciting participation, organizing setup, and other evening activities to help supplement the event and encourage attendance.



Picnic - Rich Rohrback

Organize and facilitate the club's annual summer picnic. Assure reservation for facility. Send invite and reminders about the event to track member interest and attendance. Organize club supplied entrees, as well as assign groups of club members to provide side dishes, desserts, etc. Establish event's program including individual activity leaders.
